# Syllabus - Economics of Globalization

## 1. Course description

The goal of this course is to provide an introduction to the economics of globalization. The notion of globalization is voluntary broad and includes several topics that will be covered along the course. This course is designed to provide both theoretical and empirical knowledge about globalization.

We will discuss the historical origins of globalization and reflect upon the state of the current globalization. We will then discuss the theories of trade and protectionism and interpret recent developments (e.g. the China-US trade war) in light of these theories. We will also discuss recent key issues such as the links between globalization, taxation and inequalities, the role of foreign investment and multinational firms in today's globalization and the tight links between globalization and the environment, from the coordination problems to the impact of trade and multinational firms on global warming. Some topics of international macroeconomy will be also treated.

# 2. Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, the students must be able to understand some important challenges of the current globalization. They should be able to mobilize the knowledge to discuss these challenges and the questions at the center of the policy debate. They should have a good empirical knowledge of the current globalization.
